




Yesterday after school, we went to Pui Tak Canossian College with our debate team as audience.

Harvard Club of HK 2019 Harvard Book prize Schlorship Essay Awards

Anna Liza's entry for the Harvard Book Prize Scholarship and Essay Award

(She had to complete four questions – one long (A) and three short (B, C, and D) on an assigned literary text – 'Disconnected')

I am no exception to using social media as one of my main ways to communicate with friends and distant relatives. As a regular user of social media, I post photos and comments like any other young teenager would do.

I have experienced the dilemma, which was mentioned in Carrie James' book, entitled "Disconnected: Youth, New Media and the Ethics Gap". A classmate of mine had once taken a picture of me without my consent. It may not have seemed like a big deal, but I never found out what she did to it. This incident really bothered me and I couldn't help but wonder what the purpose of doing something that pointless was? In this book, James points out the three ways of thinking often used by young people for online activities. The first is self-focused thinking which is 'only concerning about the consequences of our own actions.' The second is moral thinking concerning the consequences of the actions of those you know. 'The last is ethical thinking, about the actions of those you don't know and generally larger communities. From my personal experience, I don't think most young people would think about the moral or ethical consequences of their online activities. Their negligence has led to the constantly growing gap between how young people understand ethics in their real life and their virtual one.

Other than my own personal experiences, there are other incidents where people would often neglect the ethical consequences of their actions. For example, a British man named Leigh Van Bryan was arrested and denied entry to the U.S. on arrival. The reason was because of the tweets he had sent on Twitter, stating how he and his friend were going to "destroy America" and "dig up Marilyn Monroe". They were obviously joking, but it was no joke to local authorities. It may seem farfetched, but it was a necessary action on the part of the authorities. This particular incident highlights one of the major consequences of our reckless actions on social media. Nowadays, whenever these types of posts appear, they face hostile criticisms, even though people justify it as "just a joke" and believe that the misunderstanding will clear eventually. However, this is very often not the case. According to Carrie James' book, when faced with such dilemmas, people often emphasize their personal safety over online ethics. In actual fact, because of them choosing to ignore online ethics, it often costs them their safety in real life as well. I believe most people, especially young people, have not taken the issue of online privacy, property and participation seriously enough.

To reflect on this, ethical thought and behavior are very important when it comes to using social media. The digital ethics gap shows the direct and indirect effects our online actions have on our real life. The way we think affects the way we do things and there will always be consequences that we have to bear for ourselves. Therefore, change is much needed in our attitudinal perspective first before our actions are changed.

When it comes to my most memorable travel experience, I recall the time I spent with my Filipino family in the Philippines, so fondly. As a person with mixed blood, my families of both sides are from two entirely different countries and cultures. The last time I remember being in the Philippines was when I was five years old. Most of my cousins were either young teenagers or just a few years older than me. I couldn't communicate with them because I did not know how to speak in Tagalog and they couldn't speak fluent English, so there was a very strong language barrier between us.

In my most recent trip, it had almost been a decade since I had last seen their faces. I was truly astonished at the change in my cousins, whom I used to remember as young teenagers, but they were now gorgeous young adults! It was hard to believe how much they had all changed in such tremendous ways, so it was really a joyous reunion.

What made me the most excited was that a majority of them could now speak in English. They were not fluent but we had no problems in understanding each other clearly. They expressed curiosity about life in Hong Kong and wished to visit me in the future. They took me to an arcade, where we all had fun playing a dancing game. I, for the first time, felt that I was indeed a part of the family and will always treasure my time with my cousins.


The True Light Joint School Improvisation Workshops

Drama Viewing The Count of Monte Cristo

Last week, I had the honor of enjoying one of the most gorgeous classics-the Count of Monte Cristo which is written by Alexander Theater. After watching the trailer on YouTube, I wasn't too impressed initially, but it surprisingly turned out to be something else altogether!

The stage props fit in with the 80's background perfectly. To me, the most astounding would definitely be the prison, designed exquisitely with a hole in the place where Dantes gets out of prison, I had previously never thought of the lynching setting where Haidee punished Mondego.

At the very beginning, Edmond Dantes was a young and optimistic sailor, and was going to marry his beautiful wife Mercedes. It was a pity that Mondego and Danglars were jealous of him and ambushed him with a letter in the name of treason. After that, Dantes was prisoned for 61 years where he learnt a lot from another prisoner called Faria. They were both pursuing justice for being framed and planned for 2 years to escape from prison but only Dantes succeeded. Dantes then returned with money and status owing to the treasure he found in Monte Cristo. He also became a count. He then decided to teach Mondego and Danglars a lesson. They eventually confessed what they had done and were sent to jail. Unfortunately, the prosecutor who sent Dantes to prison did not get a penalty due to the fact that the society in those times was very unfair.

The story plot is inspiring as it is about human nature and society. Each actor is worth noting, especially Dantes and Villefort. Since The Count of Monte Cristo is a long story (long years of Edmond Dante's life in prison), the script writer adapted a bit with the characters and the plot which is also known as "artistic license." The outcome was smooth scene changes and a clear focus, No actor pulls focus when they shouldn't. As far as I am concerned, the acting skills were divine. If I had to tell of a thing that did not satisfy me, it would be the scene when Mondego and Danglars acknowledged their faults. They compromised too honestly and abruptly. Nevertheless, it is understandable as the show lasted only 60 minutes.

The story is definitely thought-provoking and it has inspired me to ask a few questions. I started to wonder "if I was Mercedes, what would I do?" In the show Mercedes did not show up, but in the fiction novel, she does. It is told that she knew Dantes was prisoned and married Mondego anyway. It seemed that love is miserable and intangible, nothing lasts forever. However, looking at the matter from another angle, why doesn't she go to search for evidence to prove Dante's innocence? Why doesn't she reject Mondego without a second thought? If I was Mercedes, I would definitely do the above. The most likely answer would be that the real Mercedes was a greedy and selfish person too. If you really loved Dantes, you wouldn't care whether he is a sailor with bright future or a prisoner? How would you marry Mondego? In fact, Dantes in the book is quite furious that Mercedes married Mondego and gives birth to baby. So I would say Mercedes is a hidden villain in the show and gives gasoline to Dantes vengeful fury.

The Bible has a quotation- "An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth", and contrarily Mahatma Gandhi had said "An eye for an eye makes the world go blind". I personally agree with the latter rather than the former quote in this instance. It is undeniable that taking revenge against someone or a group of people makes people feel powerful and gives them vanity. However, it makes the thing not get any better and instead it becomes but a vicious cycle. In the show, Dantes felt delighted when he knew Danglars and Monego were sent to jail, but failed Villefort. It is imaginable that Dantes was feeling depressed. In the long term, taking revenge is not a remedy to tackle a problem at the root. Instead, it only causes a non-stop cycle. We should therefore twist our angle and be grateful to those who taught us a valuable life lesson.

In conclusion the show is definitely worth watching, I encourage you to see this production. Especially for those who want to know about human nature, this is the show for you!





 - new friends from different countries. I would go on exchanges when I'm studying in University, so that I can widen my horizons and enjoy my life freely as a student.








Book: How to Hang a Witch

Book: Kitchen Table Wisdom Stories That Heal by Rachel Naomi

"All through my childhood, my parents kept a giant jigsaw puzzle set up on a puzzle table in the living room. My father always hid the box top. The idea was to put the pieces together without knowing the picture ahead of time. Different members of the family and visiting friends would work on it, until after several weeks hundreds and hundreds of pieces would each find their place."

"Alone in the living room early one morning, I spread out the hundreds of loose pieces lying on the table some were brightly colored and some dark and shadowy. The dark ones seemed like spiders or bugs, ugly and a little frightening. They made me feel uncomfortable. Gathering up a few of these, I hid them under one of the sofa cushions. For several weeks, whenever I was alone in the living room, I would take a few more dark pieces, and add them to the cache under the cushion."

. Frustrated, my mother finally counted the pieces and realized that more than a hundred were missing I told her then what I had done with the pieces I didn't like, and she rescued them and completed the puzzle. I remember watching her do this. As piece after dark piece was put in place and the picture emerged, I was astounded. I had not known there would be a picture. It was quite beautiful, a peaceful scene of a deserted beach. Without the pieces I had hidden, the game had made no sense."

From this little story, the author tells us that winning requires that we love the game unconditionally. Life provides all the pieces. When we accept only certain parts of life and deny and ignore the rest, we can only see our lives a piece at a time - the happiness of a success or a time of celebration, or the ugliness and pain of a loss or a failure we are trying hard to put behind us out of sight. But like the dark pieces of the puzzle, these sadder events, painful as they are, have proven themselves a part of something larger. Therefore, the brief glimpses we have of something hidden requires accepting as a gift every last piece - we are always putting the pieces together without knowing the picture ahead of time.

Q1. What captivated you the most in the story?


Answer: The story talks about human nature, what is wrong and what is right and about morality and immorality. It made me think back to something Confucius

Q: Do you love your father and would you sacrifice yourself to save your father if something bad happens?


